

Donated Notebooks

When children suffer from Acute Malnutrition, they become dangerously thin. Their face and limbs begin to swell; their immune system becomes compromised, and they are left vulnerable to developmental delays, disease, and death. 45 million children under the age of 5 suffer from malnutrition each day, and 3.5 million of those children will die this year (just under 10,000 per day). Last year TFJO food was delivered to children in Honduras, Haiti, Chad, Sudan, and on our southern border. With your help we can continue to assist those who struggle to provide the basic needs for these children.
